1. ID documents

 Never give your passport or identity documents to anyone apart from a border officer.

2. Travel

- Don't travel alone, but preferably in groups of 2-3 adults (and children).
- If you are travelling in a taxi, bus or private car, keep your friends or family regularly updated about your location.
- Take a photo of the number plate of the vehicle you are entering, and send it to family and friends.
- Don't get into a private car if the driver won't let you photograph the number plate.

3. Money

- Keep any cash in your possession well hidden.
- Bear in mind that you may have to abandon the bags or cases you have brought with you.
- Memorise the pin numbers of your EC and credit card.
- Memorise the telephone numbers of close friends and family members whom you could contact in an emergency.

4. Contacts

 Agree a code word with your family and friends to let them know you are in danger, which you can use if you are unable to talk freely.

5. Accomodation

• Leave accommodation where you don't feel safe or which makes you feel uneasy.
